DIRECTOR'S NOTES

Good Jew is a highly thought-provoking drama of identity, morality, cultural heritage and the complexities of faith. The poignant script by Frank Blocker was created with the hope of bringing to life the struggles, hopes, and transformations of the life of Holocaust Survivor Henry Changar and thus helping to ensure that he will not be forgotten.

The play is also meant to be both impactful and memorable. But it is also meant to challenge the audience to reflect on their own beliefs and the complexities of identity.

Telling the story of a Holocaust survivor at this time is more than just about preserving history; it's about shaping a better future. Every story of a person who lived during the Holocaust can be a vital tool for education, empathy, and resistance against hatred. These stories should remind people not only of the profound consequences of prejudice, but many also demonstrate the enduring strength of the human spirit. In an era where history risks being forgotten, distorted, or denied, telling the story of a Holocaust survivor remains crucial.

I am grateful to be a part of this production, a story of a Holocaust survivor. Though not famous, he had a unique and important story. I often reflect on the words of author, professor, activist, Nobel Laureate and Holocaust Survivor Eli Weisel who said "To forget the dead would be akin to killing them a second time." Thank you for coming and helping to remember Henry Changar.

BIOS

FRANK BLOCKER began working on Good Jew with his late partner, Murray Scott Changar after the passing of Murray's father, Henry. Through development work at AG Contemporary Arts, University Settlement and Peculiar Works Project, the play comes to fruition here at the Museum of Jewish Heritage. He is best known for solo works including Southern Gothic Novel (Drama Desk Award nomination) and Stabilized Not Controlled both running two years each at Manhattan's Stage Left Studio, and the adaptation HP Lovecraft's The Call of Cthulhu (The Visceral Company, Los Angeles). Off-Broadway plays include Eula Mae's Beauty, Bait & Tackle (the former Jose Quintero Theatre under Signature Theatre Company) and Suite Atlanta (78th Street Studio). He first worked with Jamibeth Margolis when she directed developmental readings of the musical Alice with composer William Wade (York Theatre Development Series, Emerging Artists Theatre). He has edited ten volumes of short plays (Stage THIS! and Stage It! 10-Minute Plays), honoring the works of other playwrights. He is a member of The Dramatists Guild as well as Actors' Equity Association and SAG/AFTRA. New York stage credits include Roderick Usher in Steven Berkoff's Fall of the House of Usher, Mr. Peachum in The Beggar's Opera (Dixon Place), Edward II (The Paradox-West Village), The Don Quixote Project, Obie-winning West Village/East Village Fragments, and the infamous The Deep Throat Sex Scandal at Bleecker Street Theatre. Regional credits include The Mystery of Edwin Drood, Me and My Girl and Amadeus. He begins a two-week run of Southern Gothic... next week in Ottawa. An ordained minister and working pastor, he lives in Naples with his partner, artist/thinker Ted de Clercg, and their retired greyhound racer, Razmus, in their tropical paradise of a yard.

JAMIBETH MARGOLIS (Director) Theatrical directing credits include *Do I Hear a Waltz?* and *Jekyll and Hyde* at the Arvada Center Theater in Denver. Recent Staged Readings: *Stalled, Bonjour Mon Amour,* and *Good Jew.* Jamibeth served as assistant director to Tony Award winner Jerry Zaks on *The Caine Mutiny Court Martial* (Broadway) and also on Jules Feiffer's *A Bad Friend* (Lincoln Center Theatre). She has also helmed developmental productions of the following new musical works: *Winesday* (currently running in NYC), *Save The Palace, Owl Creek, Great Googly Moo,* and *Warsaw.* Opera directing credits include *Tosca* and *Pirates of Penzance* (Boheme Opera NJ). She was the recipient of the SDCF Directing Observership on Mark Lamos' production of Tosca at New York City Opera. Casting credits include the Broadway and National Touring Companies of such hits as *Les Miserables, The Phantom Of The Opera, Miss Saigon, Cats,* and *Jane Eyre* as well as two dozen other shows on Broadway, as well as tours and regional theater. Jamibeth won an Artios Award for her casting of *Fiddler On The Roof* In Yiddish (directed by Joel Grey). She cast Harmony on Broadway this season. Member: SDC, CSA. Their work includes *The Importance of Being Earnest* directed by Janani Sreenivasan (Stage Manager), *Television* by Cameron Bossert (Assistant Stage Manager), *Jane's Return (2023)* (Stage Manager), and *Harmony Hall* by Duncan Pflaster (Stage Manager).

RALPH LEWIS (Producer) is a producer, director, and writer who creates multi-disciplinary performances as a co-founder of Peculiar Works Project. Current projects include *The Hare Trilogy* (Wild Project, Frankel Theater); *Astor Place Riots* (Under St. Marks); *Railroad Christmas* (Episcopal Actors' Guild); *Origins of Broadway* (BroadwayCon 2022, NY Adventure Club, ongoing); *Good Jew* (2022 United Solo Festival); and *Jane Jacobs Project* (Jane's Walk 2021, 2022, 2023). During the pandemic, he shot the short films *Language Games, Animal Magnetism* and *Intuitive Leap*; and his virtual work was presented by Municipal Art Society, Episcopal Actors' Guild, Untapped Cities, Ego Actus, and Lower Eastside Preservation Initiative, among others. We have taken work directly into local communities by presenting site-specific productions in the streets of Greenwich Village and the East Village, in landmark buildings, gutted storefronts and other peculiar sites throughout NYC. PWP continues to bring unusual work to new audiences by building partnerships with other organizations. We have produced in conjunction with HERE Arts Center, the Lincoln Center Theater Directors Lab, Judson Memorial Church, The Drama League of New York, Art Office (Bulgaria), New Bulgarian University, and Dixon Place, among many others.
